There are many different paths that lead people to consider the Catholic faith.

Life events, family and friends, joys and sorrows can all draw a person to respond to God in faith.

Each year adults of all ages from different walks of life decide to become members of the Catholic Church.

People are also welcome to find out more while still feeling undecided. It's important to know that there is no obligation, cost or pressure for a person to become a Catholic.

In the Catholic Archdiocese of Sydney, the Church offers assistance and support for people considering the Catholic faith through the Catechumenate Office. The staff at the Catechumenate Office are ready to help each enquirer with the first steps in finding out more about the Catholic faith and becoming a Catholic.

What happens if I want to become Catholic?

In most cases, enquirers are introduced to their local Catholic parish where they can be offered fellowship and support for their journey towards discipleship of Jesus Christ and membership of His Church.

Over a period of time the enquirer is introduced to the beliefs of the Catholic faith and is helped to understand how Catholics live their faith.

This usually occurs during a process called the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, commonly abbreviated as RCIA. This process is also known as the Catechumenate.

The Journey of Faith

Jesus Christ calls each of us to enter into a personal relationship with him.
Our Lord Jesus Christ offers us his friendship, compassion and forgiveness. In drawing closer to Christ, many people experience a sense of great joy and inner peace as they discover God's infinite love for them. The Holy Spirit brings us enlightenment as he strengthens and consoles us.
